Dennis' Musings

February is, for the most part, the least exciting month of the year. While it is true that this year many will be far more thrilled than usual on Ground Hog Day as the Seahawks play in the Super Bowl on February 2, the weeks that follow will be far less exciting.

Except for mid-month, when Valentine's Day seeks to touch our hearts and tap into our wallets for chocolate, flowers, fancy dinners and other tokens of affection, most of the month is not a thrilling time of the year.

Here in our part of the world it is often gray and cold and foggy and damp. Other than planting a

few bare root fruit trees it's too early to begin work in the garden. It is often too muddy to do much else. Some can schedule this as a time to escape to warmer locales or to flee to higher elevations to ski and get up above the clouds.

For some of us, February can be kind of boring. But you know - maybe that is not such a bad thing.

During my recent travels, I spent too many hours flying, too many hours in security lines, and too many hours in airports between flight. On one of those flights I found an article in the KLM airline magazine that explored the "Benefits of Boredom."

Therein a Dutch social psychologist, Wijnand van Tilburg, observed that "common momentary experiences of boredom may help people to reconsider what they find really important. Boredom helps people to abandon seemingly unimportant activities. It serves as an emotional signal that reminds us that we have more meaningful things to attend to."

The article cited recent research that suggests that being bored plays a vital role in triggering creativity and even regenerating our brains. It has to do with a neural circuit called the *default network* that switches on when we are bored. When we daydream and do nothing our brains are busy linking frontal and rear areas of the cortex. It seems that the brain is generating connections between ideas that are seemingly unrelated. The result is that new creative notions and unique perspectives can emerge.

The article's authors contend that "freed from the need to respond to the outside world, the mind explores itself." Boredom can be fertile ground for creativity.

So perhaps rather than choosing to check our email multiple times each day, turn on the TV, plug into FaceBook or find something interesting on TV when it gets dull, we might want to spend some time during this gray month just being bored.

With the over-activity I have experienced in recent months the idea is certainly appealing. May all of us take time to just be bored.

Terra's Tales

I've just had the experience, and honor, to midwife my mother through the transition to whatever follows our living. We call it death, but how little any of us really knows about what that means. What did we experience before we were born? Were we dead then?

What I'm hearing deep in my bones with this death so recent – our death watch began Christmas morning and only just finished on New Year's Day - is a true experience of that old adage "don't sweat the small stuff." Those words finally became personal. For the first time I no longer cared about what I was going to cook for dinner, how well I was dressed, whether I replied to an e-mail in a timely manner. The only thing that mattered was sitting with her, holding her hand, telling her she was loved and that it was absolutely okay for her to let go and bid this life, and all her pain, farewell. What mattered was the quality of her passing. Everything else in my life became trivial. How curious that I have heard that from sages and elders all my life. But it took my mother's passing for me to really understand. I am honored to have stewarded my mom with grace and all the compassion I could muster. And I am saddened beyond words that she is gone. My memories of her are mixed. She taught me. She frustrated me. She delighted me. And always... she loved me the best she knew how.

So what am I learning about UUCWI through this process? Somehow our congregational kerfluffles seem more silly than before. I'm not so bothered that someone is upset with what just happened, nor worried that a milestone isn't going to be met. The only thing that matters to me, at this moment, is that we care about one another, that we give each other complete "benefit of doubt," that we always assume best intentions and immediately forgive trespasses – that we are in loving relationship with each other. Ultimately, how we treat one another may be all that matters. I'm experiencing all the rest as just noise in the system. I wonder, of course, whether my current perspectives will endure ... or will I begin to be plagued by all those concerns that I now see as truly "small stuff"? It's going to be interesting to watch myself.

SRC: In the Know

Our congregation answered the SRC "what's your social justice passion" survey in December with clear guidance. Support local charities while introducing 2-3 national and international charities for us to better understand. With this month's column, we spotlight our first local charity, The Whidbey Veterans Resource Center (WVRC). Gene Berg is our Point of Contact for those who want to know more about, and hopefully volunteer with, WVRC. Here's what he wants us to know!

The Whidbey Veterans Resource Center (WVRC)
I am a member of UUCWI and a member of the WVRC. I served as an artillery officer in Vietnam from 1970 to 1971. Although I have had great good luck throughout my life, when I began attending the meetings at the WVRC, I learned I was still dealing internally with issues from my Vietnam service and I found a meaningful way to help myself and others. The WVRC is a community-based organization which seeks to connect, educate and serve veterans and their families living on Whidbey Island.

In addition to the weekly discussion groups, WVRC offers open office hours with representatives of several veterans service offices, free swimming and showers (for disabled veterans) at the community pool in Oak Harbor, an annual Stand Down, support to veterans needing transportation to VA medical care and many other support services.

On August 2, 2014, Stand Down will bring together twenty veteran support agencies, all under one roof, so Whidbey veterans and their families will have easy access to the professionals who can best serve them. This is a day of free food, entertainment, and easy access to the professionals, all in a safe and welcoming environment. For homeless veterans and veteran's families on the edge of economic or other difficulty, new clothes, sleeping bags, back-to-school supplies and clothes, food for the home pantry, and professional counseling on everything from employment and VA home loans to PTSD is available.

At the 2013 Stand Down, volunteers from UUCWI (including Mark Brown, Toyan Copeland, Judy Kaplan and Jean McIntosh)

handled welcome tables, registration, the family area and food service. Sandy Welch provided graphic design services; Ken Merrell and Alex Bonesteel's *Cranberry Bog Bluegrass Band* donated hours of entertainment. Over sixty veterans were served.
