## Community Building the UUCWI Way...

**Chalice Circles** are alive and at various degrees of wellness... how is yours faring? And what would you wish for it? Recently a few circle conveners met to share experiences and explore new topics for future conversations. Here is some of what was discovered:



- Discussions might provide deeper connections with members and friends if we selected a focused topic. One benefit might even be to discuss congregational topics and thus improve communication with the Board of Trustees and various committees.
- We are aware of the need to provide an opportunity for new members and friends to integrate into our church community, especially as our membership grows. Chalice Circles are a natural mechanism but we are not necessarily skilled at bringing new people into intimate conversations.
- The Circles are not an adequate substitute for our (new defunct) Caring Connections committee
- Nor are the circles a substitute for the "Circle" dinners or "Dinners for 8" – those are an enjoyable way to meet and socialize with diverse members and friends of the church.
- Shared leadership within each Chalice Circle is essential as well as aiming to keep a balance of new and older members and friends in a given Circle.

How do you envision your Circle enhancing your experience of UUCWI? How might you help that happen? If you are NOT a member of a Circle please inform any one of us - Corinne Ludy, John Long, Lois Chowen

### An invitation to explore "What is Ministry"?

The opening paragraph of our Letter of Agreement with our Minister establishes the expectation that ours will be a *shared ministry*. The Phase I assessment of our minister resulted in establishing excellent developmental goals for both Rev. Dennis and our Board of Trustees. Phase II is designed to build on that good work and broaden our assessment to include the overall ministry of our congregation.

An important lesson we learned from Phase I is that we bring a wide variety of ideas and experiences about what "ministry" means. We have no illusions that our diverse congregation will become perfectly clear about any one definition of "ministry", but we will certainly learn a great deal about building "shared ministry" by understanding one another's perspectives. In the next few weeks the Phase II Task Force will be inviting chalice circles, committees, and men and women's support groups to engage in conversations around the foundational questions, "What do we mean by ministry - *what* is it?, *who* does it?, and *how* do we do it? How do we build "shared ministry with and to one another, our Minister, and our wider community?" ### "Seeking Spirit" Conversations

## Around and About...

### Dennis' September Musings: *Moving Next Door*

This past month Suzanne and I moved, again. This time, unlike the other 6 times we have moved in the past 5 years, there was no U-Haul involved for we only moved next door. A neighboring unit in our complex had become available and so we purchased the condo just upslope from the one we had been living in for the past year. The peekaboo view was just a little better and there is a future option for a small addition, so once again we took on the task, or I should say tasks, of moving.

In addition to the actual move, we did some work in the new unit. We figured that painting the ceiling and the walls before taking out the carpet and installing the new wood floors would be easier than it would have been to try to do all of that whilst living in what is already a compact space. It was easier than living in the midst of a remodel, but like most remodeling tasks it was more work than anticipated.

This became even more true when the contractor we hoped would do the floor installation was not available during our time window. So, with the part time help of a young wood worker with another full time job, we did much of the work ourselves. It was a lot of work added to an already full summer schedule.

We are now fully moved in, the remodeling is done for now, and our art work is hung again. We trust that the small change in environment will make a difference in our daily life. Sometimes small changes can and do make a profound difference in our lives. Yet, such small but important changes are often very difficult to implement.

I often say to myself if I just lost 10 pounds... if I could get just 20-30 minutes of daily exercise...if I drove the car just a little less... if I waited just 5 more seconds for that other person to speak... if I flossed twice a day... if I worked in the garden just a wee bit every day... if I recycled more and bought fewer things that come prepackaged... if I regularly left 10 minutes earlier for meetings... if I watched no more than one hour of TV each day...if I baked my own bread ... if I took time to read the New Yorker... if I sat in contemplative silence just 10 minutes every day... if I could get my computer and i-Phone calendars synced... if I called or emailed or skyped my kids and my mom a bit more often... if I spent just a little more time in the woods and on the beach and doing all the other stuff that nurtures me.

Just small changes, yet each one would make a positive difference. If combined to be part of a small remodeling project they might change my life.

Big changes are made of many small pieces. Whether what we wish to change is how we spend our days or how we choose to be together as a congregational community, real change begins with small actions that seek to make our intentions real. When we move from contemplation to action transformation begins.

But enough of such speculating, pondering, and writing. It's time for the dog and me to go jogging in the woods.



## The President's Pen

This past Sunday we had a service about everyday heroes and heroines, a service designed by Effie Brown and led by Terra Anderson. It was a service that really touched me, with its wonderful music, powerful readings, and four folks from our church talking about who in the congregation are their everyday heroes and why. I have been to a number of different churches and seen some beautiful services, but I have never attended a church where surprise and delight were so often part of the experience. And I believe that this happens because of our commitment to "shared ministry," a term that you have heard frequently in the past year. To me shared

ministry means that we all share in the care for our community: its worship services, its service to the local community, and caring for one another.

There are lots of folks involved in crafting our services, and each person brings something different to the process. At least eight folks were involved in last Sunday's service and that's not counting greeters, refreshment providers, RE teachers and ushers. None of them was paid. That's not why they gave their time and talents. We believe that we all have a role to play in making UUCWI a place that meets some of our deepest needs and expresses some of our highest ideals. If we had a full-time staff, would we share as deeply making this community work? It's hard to say, but it's also a question we won't have to answer in the immediate future.

In the last few years the programs of the church have grown substantially and it's natural that we experience some growing pains. Our shared ministry works better in some areas than others. One area about which I am concerned is the ministry that used to be carried out by Caring Connections. That group used to help with needs such as support for shut-ins, transportation to medical appointments, and meals during family emergencies to name a few of the Caring Connections functions. It's been a year since we had a Caring Connection group and I wonder if some of the personal needs in our congregation are not being met. Perhaps Caring Connections is not the best solution to this problem, but I do believe that a solution is needed. Our affirmation says that we will "dwell together in peace, seek truth in love, and help one another." This help is at the core of our shared ministry. I welcome your feedback as both the Board and the congregation wrestle with this issue. Please share your ideas and reactions with members of the Board as we work to strengthen our ministry to one another.

Now that summer is ending, we are re-establishing the monthly **Southend Coffee Klatch**. ## Meet your UUCWI leaders...



### introducing John Long, president of the Board of Trustees.

I was raised in the suburbs of Tacoma and attended the quaintly-named Little Church on the Prairie. It sounds a bit like Laura Ingalls Wilder, but it was very suburban and we didn't ride to church on horseback. The church was Presbyterian, and I remember with fondness the youth program that I attended all the way through high school. We had a youth director named Bob Grove and I loved the programs that Bob created for us. It didn't hurt that a couple of girls I admired from afar also attended the youth programs on Sundays and Wednesday nights. Looking back I have to admit that the regular services didn't inspire me, often dealing with what seemed to sixteen-year-old me a prepared set of beliefs and practices that we merely had to adopt in order to accomplish our purpose in life. Not much thought and examination needed. Yet the classes Bob

led were thoughtful and frequently challenged us young folks to think about a broader world than Tacoma and the ways we might live in and contribute to that world.

Then I went off to college and church attendance, as well as any form of spiritual life, fell away as I embraced the excitement of what I took to be independence. And progressive politics seemed a much more righteous path than religion. This was the era of SDS and civil rights marches in Mississippi and Dylan's "Masters of War."

By the time I graduated and got married and served two years of alternative service, I wasn't looking for a spiritual life. I just wanted an English teaching job. I didn't know that I would find in that job (I stayed there until I retired in 2005) a community of people who shared many of the same values and cared deeply for each other as well as the kids in our care.

But in 2005 Camille and I left our Tacoma life behind and moved to Whidbey, looking for new adventures. We had no place in our lives for church at that point, but our friend Frances Wood invited us to church with her and suddenly there was a community welcoming and embracing these newcomers. At that point I had no idea how that little group meeting Sunday afternoons in the annex of Trinity Lutheran would shape my life. I often wonder what life here might have been like if it wasn't for Francie's invitation. I know it wouldn't be anything like the life I have now. And I thank you all for that!

## UU Discovery Day!

The Pacific Northwest District of UU congregations is presenting a day of workshops called Discovery Day on September 27 at East Shore Unitarian in Bellevue. The theme is Interconnection – Innovation – Impact. Leaders from UU congregations throughout the Pacific Northwest will share their passion and experience with those eager to discover how to live our faith more deeply, meaningfully and effectively, a chance for UUs to learn from one another. From 9:30 through 4:15 we have opportunity to attend as many as five 75-minute workshops led by peers and professionals. ### SRC...Be In the Know!

Did you know...that concerted action is being focused on climate change through a newly formed collaboration of Unitarian organizations? That's right! The Unitarian Universalist Association, UU Service Committee, the UU College of Social Justice, the UU Ministers Association, UU Ministry for Earth, and others have created [Commit2Respond](#). The People's Climate March in New York City on September 21 (and related events throughout the country) will kickoff Commit2Respond. What can we do in our community to support Commit2Respond? Please share your ideas with the SRC as we plan next steps.

Did you know...that 46 members of UUCWI are "totally committed" to passing I-594 to reduce gun violence by extending background checks on gun purchases in WA state? Thanks to all who completed the SRC survey and learned more about this important November ballot issue. We look forward to Board action in late August on our request for Congregational Endorsement of I-594.

Two years ago UUCWI decided to join Earth Ministry and other congregations on Whidbey Island, and to declare ourselves a **Greening Congregation**. Last year that work manifest as a series of workshops and films. This year the emphasis is on the morality of climate change. So our Fall film series, entitled, Moral Ground, begins Friday, September 26 at 7 PM in the UUCWI Sanctuary with the film [Dancing with Thoreau](#). This documentary by local filmmaker Chris Korrow debuted on June 22<sup>nd</sup> at the Clyde Theater to an appreciative audience. It explores the numerous subtle yet astounding benefits which connecting with nature has for all of us, but especially children. The film features interviews with scientists, educators and religious leaders such as: David Suzuki, Richard Louv, Denis Hayes, Rev. Sally G. Bingham, the Dalai Lama and others deeply engaged in sharing the health, cultural and psychological benefits of working and playing outside or just beholding the simple wonders of Creation. Afterwards, the filmmaker will take questions along with a representative from the Maxwellton Outdoor Classroom.
