None of us is perfect and I do not pretend to be able to fully meet, especially as a half time minister, all the wants of 100 diverse people. I do commit to a sincere effort to be responsive to whatever might merge from this exploration.

Just last week, I included in my sermon the advice that the Jedi Master Yoda gave to the

young Luke Skywalker. “Try not. Do or do not. There is no try.”

Many will recall the context of the movie story. Luke has been unsuccessful in his effort to use the Jedi “Force” to levitate a space craft. He half heartedly says he will try again and Yoda answers with the above.

To me such a statement speaks not merely of making an effort, but rather a commitment to do one’s best. I do not merely want to try a little harder, I want to do my best to further our shared goals as we together move towards making our aspirations our reality.

Committee on Ministry Invitation

Our UUCWI congregation continues to move through a time of significant transition as we evolve from an extended family congregation in size and style to a larger and more diverse community. Although we now have a one-half time professional minister, we continue to value our strong lay leadership. We have a long tradition of working together, supporting each other in creating meaningful Sunday worship experiences, helping each other on our individual spiritual paths, and in our outreach to the wider community. Our ministry is a shared responsibility.

The Committee on Ministry is a standing committee comprised of three members of the congregation with Rev. Dennis as an ex officio member. Our responsibilities include:

- The Minister and the Committee on Ministry share the responsibility of educating the congregation about ministry in general, about the particular ministry of this congregation, and the partnership of trust necessary to encourage this ministry to deepen and grow.
- Observe and make appropriate recommendations to the Minister and Board of Trustees regarding all aspects of our Congregation's ministry,
- Offer support, feedback, and guidance to the Minister
- Encourage clear communication between the Congregation and the Minister.

Feedback is important to the life of our congregation. Together with the Board of Trustees and Rev. Dennis, we invite each member of the congregation to reflect and relate her/his *personal experience* of "how are we doing – what is working well and what needs attention?" This process will take place in two phases this spring and will invite feedback in letters as well as in facilitated small group conversations.

The first phase will invite your reflection and feedback on your experience of Rev. Dennis as our minister, keeping in mind this is a half-time position. Rev. Dennis genuinely wants and welcomes feedback and it is our recommendation that he be invited to attend facilitated small group conversations as an active listener.

The second phase, later this spring, will ask you to reflect and give feedback on our congregation's mission, the health of our overall ministry, and how each of us can take responsibility to shape this joint ministry.

Please accept this invitation to share from your heart, because your voice and your experience are valued. Each person has a unique perspective that is particular to their experience. Let us choose to welcome and respect our differences, build on common ground, and learn from one another as – together – we build the community and ministry we need and we live our Covenant of Right Relations.

Support Habitat with South Whidbey Build

A site has been selected on East Harbor Road in Freeland, site preparation has begun, and churches throughout South Whidbey are coming together to support ten Air Force Academy cadets from Colorado during a week of heavy lifting and building March 23-28.

UUCWI has committed to:

- Provide bedding for 10 (given or loaned), including sheets/pillowcases, blankets, comforters, bedspreads. If you wish to loan rather than donate, your items will be returned laundered. Trinity Lutheran is providing the space and cots, but we need to keep them warm and comfortable while they sleep!
- Provide breakfast for 10 at Trinity and lunch for 20 at the Habitat Freeland Store on Thursday, March 27. Local churches are each taking one day to provide meals for the cadets, and March 27 is ours!

Social Justice Issues:

Call/write your representatives (especially Sen. Bailey) about:

- HB 2465 to close the Big Oil tax loophole and help fund education. The Washington State Legislature created this "accidental loophole" in 1949, before any oil refineries operated here. Now, Big Oil profits from the system and avoids paying \$59 million of their fair share of taxes.
- ESHB 1294 Toxic Free Kids and Families Act phases out toxic flame-retardants in children's products and home furniture.
- E2SHB 2347 Oil Transportation Safety Act to protect the health of our waterways and improve **safety** in communities across Washington decreasing our risk of **oil** spills and accidents.

News from Washington UU Voices for Justice

This session you and UU Voices for Justice have shared our values with the world and acted for justice with some success. Here's the scorecard so far.

Economic Justice

- Raising minimum wage to \$12 over 3 years (HB 2672) was not voted on in the House Appropriations Committee. Some think it may be revived during the budget process.
- Transparency and accountability for corporate tax breaks (EHB 2201) passed the House and is in the Senate
- Narrowing tax breaks for extracted fuel, increase in revenue to education (HB 2465) failed to get out of committee
- OPPOSED SSB 6524 and HB 1303, renewing for 20 years the high tech tax preferences. The Senate bill did not make it to the floor before cutoff. The house bill did not make it out of committee. Possible that Senate bill will be a part of the budget process.

Immigration Justice

- Dream Act was the first bill to make it through both chambers. It goes to the Governor for signature.
- TRUST Act never got a hearing in committee. It is a win on one level,

however. Along with our legislative priorities, our annual meeting determined that we should work directly, wherever possible, with groups most affected by the legislation. As a part of the strategy coalition for the bill we have worked side-by-side with migrant community groups to lobby. We are planning to build for next year. One strategy is to gain the support of local law enforcement while organizing at the county level for a detainer policy in those counties. Please call Voices if your congregation would like to work in your county.

Environment

- The Carbon Tax initiative was withdrawn from consideration this year by its sponsor.
- The Oil Transportation Safety Act (E2SHB 2347) passed the House and is in the Senate Energy, Environment & Telecommunications Committee

Criminal Justice

- Death Penalty. In an unexpected announcement Gov. Inslee announced a moratorium on executions. It's a step forward and very heartening, so it gets colored green.
- Background checks for all gun sales, Initiative 594. Both 594 and 591 received hearings in both chambers and huge publicity. Former Congresswoman Gabrielle Giffords testified in favor of background checks. Ultimately, the legislators took no action and its up to the voters in the fall. We still have a lot of work to do to support it. Consider asking your congregation to endorse it.
- Domestic violence gun ban (EHB 1840) passed the House and is in the Senate Law and Justice Committee
