

COP28

The 28th international COP climate summit is currently taking place in Dubai. There has been controversy over the head of the Abu Dhabi National Oil Company, Sultan Al Jaber serving as the president of the summit. This summit operates as a meeting for delegates from 200 countries to collaborate on collective action towards the climate crisis. As of December 4th, COP28 had mobilized over \$58 billion with the United States putting \$3 billion towards the Green Climate Fund. The United States has also been at the face of criticism for President Biden not attending the summit and only contributing \$17.5 million (towards the \$100 million promised) to an environmental damage and loss fund. So far, there has been some movement on sustainable agriculture and other efforts but many countries disagree over a phase-out plan for fossil fuels. In the coming days of the COP28, we hope to see stronger collaboration towards climate justice supported with concrete action plans.

Plaintiffs claim their lives were devalued in the process. Fighting climate change depends upon people around the world leading all sorts of actions - from protest to legislation to litigation. Our Children's Trust is powered by hundreds of communities and global partners across the climate movement. Key Facts About How War Impacts the Climate Crisis and the Environment

- Militaries consume enormous amounts of fossil fuels, which
 contributes directly to global warming. If the US military were a
 country, for example, it would have the 47th highest emissions total
 worldwide.
- Bombings and other methods of modern warfare directly harm wildlife and biodiversity. The collateral damage of conflict can kill up to 90% of large animals in an area.
- Pollution from war contaminates bodies of water, soil, and air, making areas unsafe for people to inhabit.
- The world's militaries account for an estimated 6% of all greenhouse gas emissions, and many governments don't even report data on
