

### USL History

USL was founded by two students from South Whidbey in 2019. Our first campaign was a series of Climate Strikes in Freeland, protesting Chase and Wells Fargo, two of the biggest investors in the fossil fuel industry. USL has pushed the City of Langley and Island County to declare a Climate Emergency, passing a declaration in Langley and a resolution in the County. We have helped implement two critical classes in the South Whidbey High School curriculum, Environmental Science and Ethnic Studies. USL organized many climate and social justice protests across Island County. During the pandemic, we facilitated three webinar series to educate ourselves and those around us re: patriarchy, discrimination, and the climate crisis.

### Summary of 2023 & Goals for 2024

Over the past year USL has organized various actions: We successfully encouraged our school district to apply for an EPA rebate for an electric bus. As a result we were invited to attend an event in Seattle where we

met EPA Administrator Regan, Senator Patty Murray, and Governor jay Inslee. A USL member had the honor of introducing Vice President Kamala Harris! We have also been continuing our push for Island County to declare a Climate Emergency Declaration organizing a series of Vocalize Our Future protests across the county. These events featured community organizers and student activists. We held our 3rd annual Fridays for Future School Walkout in September calling for stronger climate action on the local and federal level. We have collaborated with other local organizations for community advocacy and educational such as a booth at the Island Fair and a presentation to South Whidbey and Edmonds School District students. We are successfully recruiting new students than ever before!

Your contribution will help us cover: materials to build signs, fees for guest speakers, transportation costs, conference and workshop fees, video editing, and food and drinks for meetings and events. Our goals for 2024 are: to advocate for increased education funding for Washington schools; to organize a youth climate summit and continue to push for a Climate Emergency Declaration on the County and Federal levels.
