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
Announcements and News

COP28

The 28th international COP climate summit is currently taking place in Dubai. There has been controversy over the head of the Abu Dhabi National Oil Company, Sultan Al Jaber serving as the president of the summit. This summit operates as a meeting for delegates from 200 countries to collaborate on collective action towards the climate crisis. As of December 4th, COP28 had mobilized over \$58 billion with the United States putting \$3 billion towards the Green Climate Fund. The United States has also been at the face of criticism for President Biden not attending the summit and only contributing \$17.5 million (towards the \$100 million promised) to an environmental damage and loss fund. So far, there has been some movement on sustainable agriculture and other efforts but many countries disagree over a phase-out plan for fossil fuels. In the coming days of the COP28, we hope to see stronger collaboration towards climate justice supported with concrete action plans.

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The pandemic could have eased the impacts of flying.

In the spring of 2020, as the <u>coronavirus</u> swept over the globe, air travel disappeared. Airlines flew empty "ghost flights" to retain airport slots. Airport terminals were deserted. And the planet-warming <u>emissions</u> from aviation also plummeted — to less than half their <u>2019 levels</u>. As the pandemic wore on, workers grew accustomed to Zoom meetings and virtual conferences; families opted to take driving trips instead of getting on cross-country flights. Some climate experts and activists wondered if the shift in transportation would have long-term effects — transforming the way Americans travel for work and vacation.
