UUCWI is the Whidbey Island home of the Salish Sea Early Music Festival and we are privileged to welcome them for the second year.

Lutenist and guitarist Michael Freimuth from Kiel in Northern Germany joins Jeffrey Cohan for a musical tour of three centuries and five distinct necked lute), the one-piece cylindrical renaissance flute along with the bass renaissance flute, and the one-keyed baroque flute.

This program offers an unusual and expansive journey through the 16th, 17th and 18th centuries and music for guitar, lute and flute, including elaborate jazzed-up versions of well known songs of the time, published by the incredible wind instrument virtuosi of the late 16th century, along with canzonas, sonatas and suites from Spain, Italy, England and France. <u>16th</u> <u>century composers</u> Diego Ortiz, William Byrd, Giovanni Bassano and Girolamo Dalla Casa; <u>17th-century composers</u> Giovanni Paulo Cima, Girolamo Frescobaldi, Giovanni Battista Fontana, Bartolomé de Selma y Salaverde and Giovanni Battista Buonamenti; and <u>18th-century composers</u> Arcangelo Corelli and André Chéron will be represented on the program.

The Music Committee welcomes everyone and provides simple refreshments. Our Artist Series is one of the rare opportunities on the island to enjoy outstanding concerts and other events for a donation at the door. All are welcome. Bring your friends and family!

FOLLOW-UP TO JANUARY NCI MEETING:

In our January meeting, we showed the film, *Covenant of the Salmon People,* produced by the Nez Perce Tribe. If you missed our showing, you can stream the beautiful, meaningful 57-minute documentary free here: <u>*Covenant of the Salmon People*</u> importance of salmon to Coast Salish Tribes. This month is the 169th anniversary of the Point Elliott Treaty, which was one of several treaties that preserved the rights for Tribes to engage in fishing and hunting in all their usual and accustomed places. It wasn't until 1974 that a legal decision--the Boldt Decision-- was made to enforce those treaty rights, and only after the Native people engaged in many strong political actions, collectively called the Fish Wars.

See a Timeline of the Fish Wars and the Boldt Decision.

Read a detailed account in the Seattle Times by one of our favorite reporters, Lynda Mapes: <u>how the Boldt Decision 50 years ago</u> remade Pacific Northwest fishing. A short documentary about the fish wars and the Boldt decision is embedded in the article.

The Epidemic of US gun violence continues to escalate and children are suffering. There were a record 656 mass shooting and <u>82 school shooting</u> in the USA in 2023. There were 42,926 gun deaths in 2024. These numbers are steadily growing. In 2008 there were 18 school shootings. There have already been 2 in 2024. Basic facts related to children:

- Guns violence is now the leading cause of death for US youth
- 4,000 are killed annually and 15,000 injured by gun violence
- 3 million have been directly exposed to gun violence

- 80% believe it is a problem
- 60% believe laws should be stricter
- 51% are worried about school shooting
- many know someone who has been injured or killed
