Martha Durkee-Neuman, minister intern from Edmonds UU, will lead all of us in group discussions and exercises to discern who we are today, what we are longing for and where we want to be headed. This will provide the BOT with valuable information in their considerations of hiring a minister. Please plan to attend. Your thoughts will be important.

The BOT is appointing Linda Flanagan-Freeburg as a Trustee to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Lois Chowen several months ago.

The Finance Committee (Tom B and Mark Saffitz) and BOT Treasurer (Janet G) are creating a draft of an operating budget for the coming year for the BOT's consideration – in anticipation of the Pledge Drive.

Frances W, Jane S, and Clara B are heading the upcoming Pledge Drive. They have begun their work of creating a timeline and materials to be distributed. More details will be available soon.

UUCWI has received a \$3,000 unrestricted grant from the Whidbey Community Foundation. The BOT will be discussing how best to use this grant at their upcoming meeting.

This promises to be a real musical highlight of the season.



THE LARAMIE PROJECT -- A PLAY Saturday, March 2, at 7 PM

This is a special opportunity to see a remarkable play brought to us by the Whidbey Playhouse. One niaght only.

The Laramie Project presents a deeply complex portrait of a community's response to the 1998 murder of Matthew Shepard, a young gay man living in Laramie, Wyoming. In a series of poignant reflections, the residents of Laramie react to the hate crime and surrounding media storm with anger, bewilderment, and sorrow. The play portrays the seismic and deeply personal impact Matthew's death had on this small town while also demonstrating the power of the human spirit to triumph over bigotry and violence. The cast is mostly Oak Harbor High School Students. There are a few roles being played by non-students.

This quote by Martin Luther King Jr. while he was in the Birmingham City Jail resonates strongly as the crisis in Gaza surpasses 100 days. In the fight for justice and peace, a permanent ceasefire is crucial to end the significant loss of life, stop the escalating genocide of Palestinians, and to enable Israeli hostages to be released. We strongly urge you to contact your legislators, <u>sign on to petitions</u>, join protest for an immediate ceasefire.

War- Bad for People- Bad for Planet*: The planet-warming emissions generated during the first two months of the war in <u>Gaza</u> were greater than the annual carbon footprint of more than 20 of the world's most climate-vulnerable nations. USL Interrupts Island County Meeting to Call for an Immediate Climate Emergency Declaration

On Tuesday night, USL disrupted the Island County Comprehensive Plan Open House at South Whidbey High School to demand the commissioners pass a Climate Emergency Declaration. This Open House is aimed at helping guide the work of Island County for the next 20 years, which USL believes must acknowledge and address the escalating climate crisis. The action included 14 students and community members marching into the meeting urging the county to recognize the impact of the climate crisis currently and for future generations.

USL's Demands for Island County

USL called for Island County to adopt a Climate Action Plan, as well as implement specific demands USL feels will help to mitigate the climate crisis. The Climate Action Plan would help to hold the county accountable and make sure that they are prioritizing and expediting climate-centered work. It also opens more opportunities for funding the county's efforts to work against climate change.

On Tuesday night, USL listed their demands in a People's Mic speech, including that Island County hire a Climate Action Manager who could help them make more sustainable choices and implement more sustainable measures. Another one of USL's demands is to establish a Climate Committee that community members could be involved in so that they can hold the county more accountable as well. Youth are disproportionately impacted by the climate crisis so we ask that the Island County also include more youth input in their work.

These children are vulnerable to brutal labor practices, including trafficking and slavery.
