

Nominating Committee Call for Volunteers




THE LARAMIE PROJECT -- A PLAY


Saturday, March 2, at 7 PM UUCWI Sanctuary

This is a special opportunity to see a remarkable play brought to us by the King & Whidbey Playhouse. This performance on South Whidbey is one night only. All of the lines spoken are from interviews of members of the Laramie, Wyoming community.

The Laramie Project presents a deeply complex portrait of a community's response to the 1998 murder of Matthew Shepard, a young gay man living in Laramie, Wyoming. In a series of poignant reflections, the residents of Laramie react to the hate crime and surrounding media storm with anger, bewilderment, and sorrow. The play portrays the seismic and deeply personal impact Matthew's death had on this small town while also demonstrating the power of the human spirit to triumph over bigotry and violence. The cast is mostly Oak Harbor High School Students. A few roles are played by non-students.

Education Funding Community Forum

USL is hosted a forum Tuesday, February 20th in the South Whidbey High School New Commons to discuss priorities of students and community members for the current Washington State legislative session. We reviewed active bills and other concerns which we will be advocating for. This event is part of our Transforming Education campaign, pushing for equitable funding for small and rural school districts like South Whidbey and Coupeville. As students, we have seen firsthand the effects of insufficient funding on our education. We are calling on legislators to prioritize education funding.

USL is planning a trip to Olympia on February 23rd to meet with legislators, Representatives Chavers and Paul as well as Senator Muzzall from the 10th Legislative District as well as members of the Education Committee. 
