The Avocado Threat to Planet and People: Please Sign the Petition

Tell U.S. grocery stores to adopt avocado-sourcing policies that protect human rights and monarch habitat. Most avocados sold in the USA come from a single region in Mexico, where the industry burns forests and uses an enormous amount of water (18.5 gallons) to produce one avocado, in a region already suffering from extreme drought. Their production also brings land grabs, pollution, and violence to Indigenous and other local communities. Research from Climate Rights International has linked this devastation to importers that supply major U.S. grocery stores with avocados.

Great News for the Ecosphere: Putting the lid on LNG

Led by <u>Third Act's</u> efforts President Biden agreed to pause approvals of Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) exports, Here is the <u>official language</u>. To thank President Biden and Energy Secretary Granholm for this important life affirming action use this <u>link</u>. Meanwhile here in the other Washington the Puyallup tribe and their allies forced PSE to stop plans on developing a massive LNG plant in Tacoma that threatened the Pullayup reservation.
