It seems almost beyond belief, but there are many people who are absolutely convinced that the earth is flat.


Let's explore this extraordinary attitude — and also dare to reflect on which of our own cherished beliefs are irrational or weird.





# Saturday, March 2, at 7 PM UUCWI Sanctuary

This is a special opportunity to see a remarkable play brought to us by the King & Whidbey Playhouse. This performance on South Whidbey is one night only. All of the lines spoken are from interviews of members of the Laramie, Wyoming community.

The Laramie Project presents a deeply complex portrait of a community's response to the 1998 murder of Matthew Shepard, a young gay man living in Laramie, Wyoming. In a series of poignant reflections, the residents of Laramie react to the hate crime and surrounding media storm with anger, bewilderment, and sorrow. The play portrays the seismic and deeply personal impact Matthew's death had on this small town while also demonstrating the power of the human spirit to triumph over bigotry and violence. The cast is mostly Oak Harbor High School Students. A few roles areplayed by nonstudents.

### Education Funding Forum Recap

Last Tuesday, February 20th, USL hosted a community forum to discuss our priorities for the 2024 state legislative session. We conversed with community members and took what we learned to Olympia to meet with our legislators. We spoke with them on many issues of concern due to the 10.4% budget cut this year, including: overcrowding of buses and buildings due to the closure of the middle school, large class sizes and limited high school course selection, as well as infrastructure problems and a lack of resources for gender-neutral bathrooms. Coupeville School District has also reduced their budget by about 10% and dealing with: unsafe drinking water due to contaminant pollution, loss of teachers and staff, and a significant reduction of their Farm to School Program. We want to thank the community members who attended the event. Your input is very important to us.

Here are a few bills that are currently in committee that we are strongly recommending our legislators support. RSS

The South Whidbey School District has noticed a significant drop in the number of students eating school lunches since COVID funds for free lunches ran out. It is essential that nutrition is available to all students and not just defined by the pandemic. Providing free, nutritional school lunch to all students also comes with the advantage of reducing waste, something the SWSD is working towards. If almost all students are eating school lunches, they are not bringing extra packaging and the school can provide waste-free alternatives.

#### Requiring and Funding Zero Emission Buses (SB 5431)

Diesel school buses leave an irreversible impact on our environment. This bill would be a tremendous step towards preserving a future for younger generations. The emissions from the buses also take a toll on students' health, leaving kids at greater risk of asthma and other respiratory diseases. The bill's grant program would also offer support for rural and small districts to have the resources to afford electric buses.

#### Lowering the Supermajority for School Bonds to 50% (SJR 8207)

This amendment of the WA Constitution is imperative to help limit the inequities between districts, specifically small rural school districts. Our school district, among several others in the region, has struggled for years to pass a bond, often reaching over the 50% threshold but slightly under the 60% mark. This lack of proper infrastructure has led to water leaking through ceiling tiles in classrooms, tripping hazards due to uneven flooring, mold exposure, and much more. This reality makes it extremely difficult for students to receive an education in a safe environment, which they deserve and require.

While these are current bills in the legislature, there are many other areas we feel need to be addressed including: comprehensive funding for paraeducators, teachers, and staff; support for the arts; a student voice in creating learning standards (a focus of Rep. Shavers), and movement away from zip code-based funding models. We believe that there needs to be a complete overhaul and change to the prototypical school funding model to support rural school districts.

#### MLK Blessed Are the Peacemakers Event

On Saturday, Feb 24th St. Augustine's Episcopal Peace Fellowship hosted the "Blessed Are the Peacemakers" in honor Martin Luther King jr. and to raise awareness about the escalating epidemic of gun violence in the USA. There were a horrifying 80 school shootings last year and 288 since 2018. During that same period Canada and France had 2, Germany had 1, while Japan, Italy and the UK had none.
