Kurt Hoelting shares stories from his recent experiences with Central American refugees in Mexico, volunteering with Ukrainian refugees in Poland, and leading a weeklong Zen Peace Vigil in Kyiv, Ukraine. He reflects on what made these experiences powerful for him, the growing crisis of forcibly displaced peoples, and the positive impact of choosing to take some personal action in response.

Kurt invites all congregants to stay after the service for a conversation about the topics addressed in his sermon.
