Small Group Ministry Coming to UUCWI

What are Chalice Circles? Chalice Circles, also known as Covenant Groups, are a form of UU Small Group Ministry. These groups consist of 6-10 members and operate under a shared covenant, committing to each other and a higher purpose. Sign-ups to participate will continue through May at a table in the foyer or by email to pastor@uucwi.org. There will be an organizational session with Rev. Kate Lore for all persons signed-up after the service June 9, 2024.

How often do they meet? Chalice Groups meet monthly or more often in venues agreed upon by the group. For this first round, we ask for a 6-month commitment.

What happens in these groups? Each session centers around a topic or question suggested by leadership, fostering community, deepening relationships, spiritual exploration, support, accountability, and leadership development. Conversation is led by a facilitator.

How will I know who is in my group? Preferences for group assignments, including considerations for spouses, friends, and geographical proximity, will be taken into account by the Pastoral Care Team in making group assignments in addition to the value of promoting new connections among members of the congregation. Initial group assignments and meeting templates will be presented by the PC Team in June.

Will there be facilitators? The first session will be facilitated by PCT members, with subsequent facilitation determined by each group. - Groups will develop their own covenants, encouraged to use a "talking stick" during meetings. - Monthly spiritual themes, reflection questions, quotations, and readings will be provided by the PCT. Themes may include Aging, Community, Kindness, and more.

White House Climate Emergency Declaration Letter

United Student Leaders, along with 425 other groups, signed a letter calling on the Biden administration to declare a climate emergency, protect frontline communities and workers, and advance their commitments to "transition away from fossil fuels" It was sent to the White House last week. Banking on Climate Chaos Report

This report is the most comprehensive analysis on fossil fuel banking produced to date investigating fossil fuel financing of the world's 60 largest banks which has reached nearly \$6.9 trillion in the eight years since the historic Paris Agreement. It highlights frontline stories of people leading the fight. In spite of the known threat banks continue to finance fossil fuel expansion by \$705 billion in 2023 alone.
